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


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
THE CLOVER INITIATIVE

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TIP SHEET

WHEN DID YOU FIRST REALIZE YOU WANTED TO BE A WRITER?

I decided very early on I wanted to write for a living. I was twelve-years-old and I had just finished my first read of Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire when I realized: there are people out there, adults, who make a living out of writing books. I thought it was the coolest thing ever and since books made me feel so safe; I wanted to pass that feeling onto others.

WHERE DO YOU GET YOUR IDEAS FOR YOUR BOOKS?

This is a hard question. I think most of my ideas either come from being inspired by other authors or from fever dreams. X-Men and other superhero stories I grew up reading inspired my first novel, Refurbished. The ideas behind most of my short stories come from strange fever dreams.

WHAT DO YOU THINK MAKES A GOOD STORY?

I belong to the school of writing that believes characters are the basis of any good story. As a reader, I'm character-oriented, which means I will enjoy more well-crafted and realistic characters than the overall plot of a story or worldbuilding. Not to say that the rest of the story elements aren't valuable, but I'm a lot more forgiving of any issues the story might have if I'm reading about people that feel real and well-rounded.

WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO WRITE PRIMARILY IN ENGLISH AND NOT IN YOUR NATIVE LANGUAGE?

I was raised to look for better opportunities abroad. Moving to the US was something already in my life plan, but what truly sold me on becoming a writer who focuses mainly on the English language was learning this language from scratch. I made a poor English student, and it took me several years to master it, but I loved its essence. Spanish will always have a special place in my heart because of its richness and complexity, but I feel like English allows me to be more playful, and it expands my creativity to new levels.





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
